"What is a Certified Research Administrator (CRA)?: Professional Development in Research Administration"

<u>Session 1:</u> Developing a Funding Agenda in Sustainability

Moderator: Justin Miller, Proposal Manager, Sponsored Programs Office, Ball State University A number of schools in Indiana, including Indiana State, Ball State, and Rose-Hulman, have signed the American College& University Presidents Climate Commitment, which aims for schools to reach carbon neutrality as soon as possible. Many other schools, such as IU, Purdue, and Notre Dame are weighing this commitment, and are unsure, given the economic and administrative impact if they can achieve the Commitment's goals.

One way of assisting both current and potential signatories, as well as other schools interested in addressing sustainability is through external grant opportunities. This session will survey the current funding climate including, federal and state agencies, foundations, and the private sector and provide examples of projects, including campus initiative, faculty research, and community outreach.
