A specialist in the American Revolution and the Early American Republic, he is the author of A Republican Revolution: Ideology and Politics in Pennsylvania, 1771-1790 (1989). Before joining the NEH staff, he was assistant and associate editor of seven volumes of The Papers of Benjamin Franklin (1978-1987) at Yale University. He continues to pursue historical editing projects.
